



## Redward secures CHAMPION CARCASE

#### Redward Red Polls achieved Champion Carcase at the recent Pakenham Agricultural Society's Carcase competition

In a region renowned for quality cattle, this year's competition was no exception with 40 head entered across 3 classes.

The purebred Redward Steer was in the 330 - 385kg live weight class in which there were 20 entries.

Live weight for the steer was 340kg, HSCW 203kg with a dress percentage of 60% and a winning score of 88.676.

The local Abattoir who support the event also allow viewing of the body which is a great opportunity for all exhibitors, Red Polls had a successful event with 6 entered in total, 4 in Class 2 and 2 in Class 3 - on the Hook all 6 finished in the top half of their classes.

#### These entry's comprised

> Tiraslea Red Polls of Anne and Frank Moya had two heifers entered in Class 3, one of which secured 3rd placing on the hoof, and went on to be a very close 4th on the hook and their second heifer placing 8th on the hook.

- Red Cactus exhibited 2 steers which both placed in the top half of the hook results in Class 2.
- Redward exhibited 2 steers who placed 1st and 3rd in Class 2 on the hook.
- The Red Cactus and Redward steers were all 9 months of age, from first calving heifers and all sired by Eurimbla Fable.

These great Red Poll results follow consistent results for Red Polls from Victoria which were entered in Carcase competitions toward the later part of 2016.

- > Whittlesea Agricultural Society 36 entry's in total.
- Class 1 Lightweight.
- > Redward steer 4th on the hoof and 2nd on the Hook with 3rd & 4th place on the hook going to B.E & L.E Johnson from Lynbarry Red Polls.
- > Lynbarry also took out a 2nd on the hook at Yea Agricultural Society where there were 40 entries in total.

# Why we chose Red Polls

Report by Reg Simson - 'Gananny' Quirindi NSW 2343

We have been a Poll Hereford/Hereford herd for sixty five years. Our decision to choose Omega 3 Red Poll bulls was easy.

We decided that the traits we wanted were:

- easy calving for joining to heifers at fifteen months
- > quiet temperament
- > an established breed
- consistent cherry red colour
- good doing ability
- > saleability

... and the Red Poll breed ticked all these boxes.

Red Poll is a very long standing Australian breed with natural constitution, hardiness and adaptability. Crossbreeding produces progeny with a consistent and appealing cherry red colour, a colour that handles the heat and at times intense solar conditions well.

Good doing ability, the Red Polls put on weight and condition in all seasons. Our cows and calves were only supplemented with vitamins, minerals and protein meal in a dry lick. There was no backlining or drenching and their progress was amazing with no tail in the mob.



Saleability was important and at the Gunnedah Powerhouse weaner sale the Red Poll/Hereford cross steers made the same cents per kilo as any other breed on the day. The highlight of the sale was the heifer sisters who sold above comparable rates from other breeds.

Both the steers and heifers, after a tough season, presented well as very even, bright red in colour, quiet natured and well-muscled animals.

An added benefit was that the Red Poll eliminated all horns from the progeny.





## **Estimable Awards**

There are three awards Red Poll breeders regard with high esteem which have a comprehensive history

#### The Parker Performance Award

The award was donated to the Red Poll Cattle Breeders Association of Australia by Mr and Mrs E Parker of South Africa to commemorate their visit to Australia in 1965.

This is presented annually to the most successful exhibitor at a nominated Royal Show within set classes and the championships.

Conditions apply before points can be gained and the Executive Officer calculates the award winner annually. The award has been won by many studs over the years with the 2016 recipient being Red Cactus.

#### The Brigadier G.S. Hurst Memorial Trophy

One of the great characters in the Red Poll breeds history was Brigadier George Hurst DSO OBE, who founded and ran Larkhill Stud at Goulburn from the mid1940s to its dispersal in 1971.

As well as initiating the Red Poll magazine in 1962, serving in the NSW committee for more than 20 years and having two stints as Federal President, the pipe smoking former Indian Army officer almost single handedly raised the profile of Red Poll cattle in the post-WWII years.

Hurst began a Red Poll vealer production herd in 1938 and was so pleased with the results that by 1945 he'd quit other breeds to opt for a 100%Red Poll operation, including Larkhill stud. By 1954 Hurst had 1000 breeders and their steer calves were giving notable and financial evidence of the Red Poll's outstanding ability as a vealer breeder. Soon he was running field days and clinics at Larkhill for breeders of all type as of cattle.

Initially, and with Mrs Hursts permission, the federal council at the time, introduced the hoof and carcase competition which was known as the Brigadier Hurst Memorial Trophy for the highest aggregate of points scored by Red Poll steers or steers sired by a red poll bull in steer and carcase competition.

The Brigadier Hurst Memorial Trophy perpetuates the memory of one of the great larger-than-life individuals of Red Poll history in Australia.

Nowadays, this trophy is awarded to the most successful Red Poll prime steer exhibitor. It is open to all breeders and fatteners of Red Poll or Red Poll cross cattle. Prize money is presented by the National Executive for the highest aggregate of points scored by exhibitors in all breed steer and carcase competitions throughout Australia. The competition is run over a calendar year and breeders are required to submit entries to the Executive Officer before January 31 of the year following the competition. Recent winners of the Brigadier Hurst have been Oakwood and Redward Red Poll Studs with Redward the 2016 recipient.

#### The Princess Royal Cup

This was presented by the Red Poll Society of Great Britain and Ireland and is offered for competition each year at the Melbourne, Perth, Sydney, Brisbane and Adelaide Shows. In the first year of competition (1953) the trophy was awarded for the most successful exhibitor in the Red Poll section. Regional groups now determine by a majority decision what the trophy is awarded for at their show. The Princess Royal Trophy is not actually held by the winner but the appropriate Royal Show Society on behalf of the ARPCBI. It presents prize money to the winner at the relevant Royal show.

# From the Archives - January 1965

#### A glimpse of Uncle Sam's Red Polls

For two years I had promised Warren McVey to pay him a visit at Purdue University before he retired. At the same time I received an official invitation from the American Red Poll Cattle Club to certain important Red Poll occasions including their 21st Annual Breed Sale and AGM at Louiseville, Kentucky.

Having reached San Francisco three quarters of an hour before I left Sydney!! (Owing to the International dateline) I arrived at the meeting having clocked up 10,000 miles.

Like Australia, America is a large country, the breed is spread over a wide area in small pockets, with a great variation of climate, nourishment and economic conditions. Type is therefore controversial, and as varied as the opinions of members. Finances are restricted but owing to the unity of thought in certain branches, where cattle are bred with the same objectives in view, a valuable solidarity has come to life in the Corn Belt.

I often wonder how many members know the value of unity of effort, in our competitive rivalry with other breeds.

It was continually impressed upon me all the time I was in America, how much was known by individual breeders about their own cattle. Twenty years ago, a brief recital of milk and butterfat figures ended all Red Poll conversations and arguments. This is no longer so.

The Cattle Club of America with the research work behind it at Pinney Purdue has introduced a GAIN REGISTER and a CARCASE REGISTER. These two innovations are helping breeders to learn a lot more about their cattle and enjoy them more.

Four Universities in the Corn Belt hold all BREEDS BULL or STEER FEED Trials; in these Red Polls have continuously made impressive scores against all breeds.

A breed type conference is held every second year and is helping considerably towards tolerance on the matter, and a recognition, that if you want to sell, you must have the goods people want.

With the introduction of the carcase register, information on carcasses has become an everyday subject of conversation amongst members. One hears everywhere "Loin Eye", "Bark", "Dressing Percentage", Daily Gain", Cost per lb. of gain", etc. These are all talking points and now England is Beef Recording and South Africa making a start.

As a result of the points score in carcase competitions it looks as if Quality Carcases are Hereditary. For years Marshall Mohler of Pinney Purdue Farm has published Bloodline information. Now with the fact firmly established that certain bulls and females produce top quality carcases, further University Research on Heredity for High Quality Meat has been started.

All this information is reaching breeders as it comes out.

#### Why I started a Red Poll stud

My grandpa had a big Red Poll bull from the stud Almora, he was super quiet and I loved the colour. temperament and the calves he sired.

#### When I started

I started my stud in March 2013 when I was 12 and bought my first 6 heifers. I went to the Whittlesea Maine Anjou and Red Poll sale in 2013 and was looking for a couple of heifers to breed from to the Red Poll bull we already had. I ended up buying 6 heifers that I personally liked. I wasn't going by structure as I didn't know anything about stud cattle or running a stud. It was from there I was encouraged to start a stud and become a member.

In 2014 I went back to the Whittlesea sale and bought the top priced Red Poll bull and heifer from Stormley Red Poll stud. I loved the big frame, colour, temperament and structure of the bull and the heifer's temperament and looks.

In 2015 I went back again and bought the full blood sister to the heifer I bought in 2014.

## Everyone wants a curve bender... at both ends

#### Report from the Progeny Test Group

For those unfamiliar with the term 'Curve Bender' it is used to describe those animals which do not abide by the normal rules of development.

A normal growth graph will be a regular curve with birth weight, growth at different ages, and mature size all above or below average. In breeding cattle we desire a low birth weight and low mature weight but a high growth to market weight. These are the ones called curve benders. They are comparatively rare in the population and hence genetically very valuable.

We also use the term a little loosely to describe an animal which breaks the normal links between traits e.g. it is normal that animals which carry more muscle also carry less fat, so one that carries above average muscle and above average fat is again a 'curve bender'.

Sounds pretty basic stuff but gets a lot more difficult when you set out to identify and then breed them.

**Example 1:** A bull with a typical growth curve. He is in the top 1% of the breed for 200, 400 and 600 day growth, but carries with that a well above average figure for birth weight and mature weight.

**Example 2:** A bull that is a curve bender at the top end. He is in the top 1% for 200 day growth, top 4% for 400 day and top 7% for 600 day growth but has a well below average figure for mature cow weight. At the lower end (birth weight) he is still well above average.

In the last year the Progeny Test Group has had many discussions on this subject. Every time the conclusion becomes 'Get the data on your animals submitted to BREEDPLAN and you will find the animals to work with'... and they are starting to emerge.

The Progeny Test Group started three years ago among a group of breeders who were interested in working together, and with the BREEDPLAN system, to improve the commercial performance of our Red Polls. In those days it was unnamed and the early action was to try and import semen from an overseas bull which had strongly measured traits. This overseas introduction would have provided a direct linkage and ultimately comparison of performance across countries. When these negotiations could not be finalized the group set about using a high performance Australian bull across eight herds. The objective of this move was to ensure strong linkages across herds. Using one bull could help identify superior cows and also provide strong comparisons between the performance of the AI sire and the herds own sires. Some herds already had strong linkages from other sires.

Because of various calving times and individuals programs we now have calves weaned and measured and others at various stages along that path. Other bulls have been selectively used in the most recent round of AI programs and the plan is to select the best progeny and collect semen and use across the group. The exciting time will be to see whether the best performing young bull comes from the AI sire or someone's existing sire.

The Group meets via telephone hook up every couple of months and has valued the input from overseas breeders who have contributed their thoughts via email. Making best use of the telephone hook ups has been a learning process which has matured and is working well. The Group is still developing the most suitable business model.

The Group was fortunate to have a full session with the manager of a major Stud from another breed who provided an insight into their operation and gave some very practical tips on making systems work. One of his strong messages was that not every buyer wants the same type or performance from their purchases and the other was that there is always a market for low birth weight bulls. What this also tells us is that we must have verification of the accuracy of the predicted performance of the traits required.

Catriona Millen from SBTS has joined our phone hookups and provided meaningful advice to our discussions.

There has been a major boost given to the work of the Group by the Breed changing from the old ILR1 computer system which only ran an annual GROUP BREEDPLAN analysis to ILR2 which produces a monthly analysis. This means that within a month of any new data being inputted that data is reflected across all herds.

# This has the potential to completely change the face of our industry as we know it

What are the implications for us as Livestock Producers? The answer is pretty simple. Every animal we sell will be subject to this x-ray process and we will get a very accurate measure of the fat meat and bone in the animal.

If this includes meat eating quality, then we have all of the information required for a value based payment system. Each animal you sell will be valued according to the final value it achieves when it has been boned out and packed.

So, this brings on the genetic race big time. We already know that there are huge differences between animals in their final value. I have seen examples of \$100 differences in small groups of animals from the same herd the same age and similar weights. Just imagine how good it will be to find the bull who sires steers that are worth \$50 or a \$100 a head more that the bull you used last year. And get paid for it! Well, all of this is going to become possible.

We certainly live in exciting times

#### **DEXA** technology

Over the past three years MLA has worked with industry, research institutes and technology providers to develop the application of DEXA (Dual Energy X-Ray Absorptiometry), an objective measurement tool which measures meat, fat and bone in a carcase (carcase composition).

This information can help the entire red meat value chain make more informed business decisions to improve on-farm and processing efficiency and deliver a product which is preferred by consumers.

Longer term, investment in DEXA and other objective measurement technologies currently under development will help to reduce the industry's annual multi-million dollar cost of grading.

#### What DEXA does

DEXA has been used for decades in the medical industry to measure bone density and body fat composition. By using an existing mature technology, MLA, in collaboration with industry partners, has shortened the timespan to apply it to lamb and beef carcase scanning.

In the red meat industry, DEXA technology provides timely, accurate, transparent and objective information on the lean meat, bone and fat composition of each carcase which can be added to existing eating quality carcase feedback.





# South Australian Heifer Expo Youth Awards

The winner of the 2016 ARPCBI Youth Award was Cassy Hughes of the Booleroo Centre in South Australia's mid north. Cassy's application impressed as it showed enthusiasm and passion for the beef industry, and in particular Red Poll cattle

My name is Cassy Hughes, aged 17 from Booleroo Centre in SA's Mid North and this year I was lucky enough to represent Red Polls at the 2016 South Australian Junior Heifer Expo after being awarded the ARPCBI Youth Award. I had attended the SAJHE two consecutive years prior to 2016; handling heifers from Moyle Park Red Poll stud, and was the recipient of the NHD young breeder's award in 2014. Since then I have started my own Red Poll cattle stud, Wilsdon View.

The 2016 SAJHE was a great learning experience! Over the three days participants were given complete responsibility for a heifer and the opportunity to learn from people in specific areas. Educational sessions included butchering, EBV's, mineral nutrition, careers, marketing, feedlotting, scanning and aspects of showing such as parading, clipping and junior judging. There is so much to learn that a few days does not feel long enough! The part I learnt the most from was from the feedlotting session, where I was lucky enough to be given a tour around Princess Royal Feedlots near Burra, SA. On the final evening and following morning there are heifer and handler classes that everyone participates in, and there are stewards around the ring to help out, or give tips to, first timers that may not have shown before.

It's not just about the educational sessions but the people you meet and contacts you make. As it was my third year attending I already knew a lot of people and talking to others with the same passion for cattle regardless of the breed enables you to pick up and adapt different ways of doing things to suit you and your animals.

At the end of the expo, there are many awards given out to recognise those that excelled in the different areas. I was awarded the Intermediate Encouragement Award.

During the rest of 2016, I have continued working with Richard Daley, to prepare and show his cattle at the Crystal Brook Show and Royal Adelaide Show (unfortunately other local shows were cancelled due to weather). As the only SA youth member I also attended the Red Poll AGM and tour. It was great to meet heaps of new people from throughout Australia and hear about their studs and involvement with the breed.

In the last two years I have met and worked with the previous two winners of this award, Kieran Sullivan and Briony Looker. I think the award presents a great opportunity to have interstaters attend with different styles and views on cattle. The way things are done

## Western Australia Report

Seasonal conditions throughout the agricultural area have been very favourable for much of an extended growing season. Some areas have lost yield potential with waterlogging in late winter and spring has been cold with many grain crops frost affected. There are estimates of around 20% grain loss across the board but some individuals will be devastated with major loss.

There has been limited activity in the Region during the year. Members did enjoy hosting last year's AGM and stud tour. Two members exhibited with success at Sydney Royal Show again this year. Cattle have also been exhibited at Wagin and Brunswick Shows.

Numbers were down considerably for Perth Royal with only three studs exhibiting a total of 12 animals. However the breed received very favourable comment on the quality of animals exhibited and awards were well distributed amongst the three studs. It is hoped that some changed circumstances will see the usual exhibitors back next year.

Locally while commercial prices are good demand for stud cattle has been very limited.

It was with deep regret that the WA region lost member Bob Hall of the Hallmark Red Poll Stud on Saturday 2nd July. Bob and Bey ran the Hallmark stud and were the last WA members of the association before the merger.

Bob was a loyal family man with a strong sense of community. He grew up on the farm 'Sleepy Hollow', and farmed alongside his wife Bey on the property 'Koolena". He was softly spoken but always listened to.

Bob originally ran a herd of mostly angus commercial cattle but in 1974 purchased six mated stud red poll females to start the Hallmark stud. Luck however did not always run Bob's way and those six females produced five bull and only the one heifer calf. Over time using his home bred bulls Bob turned his commercial herd to mostly red, but he did mention one day that he had one animal that would qualify under the upgrading rules at the time as a purebred Red Poll, but it was completely black.

He was often short of feed and developed a strain of hardy cattle that were of medium size and adapted to the conditions. During tough financial times he maintained the registrations of the cattle through the Association Herd Books. He bemoaned the higher costs of the Society and a lack of understanding and support for the breed from agents but always remained committed to the qualities of the cattle.

Bob always was a willing worker for the Region and members enjoyed his participation and visits to the 'Koolena' farm. When he retired, eight years ago, the herd was dispersed with members afforded the opportunity to select any cattle they desired. Some of the cattle and their descendants are still flourishing in herds today.

Most WA Red Poll stud breeders were in attendance to pay their respects at his funeral on the 9th July. We share a poem penned by Bob's son Glenn, which was read at his funeral. The poem is written as if thru Bob's eyes and allows us all to reflect.

We toiled hard and farmed the land We did our best, in the "Koolena" sand Together we loved our family, they were our number one Bev we have guided them, an important job well done


Then, our small family eventually grew With three great spouses and six grandsons too So proud of them all and they brought me joy All showing traits, of the "Sleepy Hollow" boy


No regrets, as I take one last look Maybe, should have penned a history book I contributed to my community, where I could I treated all as equals - as everyone should






# Report for Victorian Region

The year kicked off with Greg Abbott's Open Day during Beef Week on February 3. The day was well attended by people from far and wide and Greg's Red Polls were very well presented and created a lot of interest. He is now selling branded Red Poll meat to a local Hotel.

Our Victorian Region On Farm Challenge, organised by a Committee headed by Don Castle, was held on April 17, 22-26 with Annette Walker officiating. Junior Champion Heifer went to Damian & Sandra McAlinden with Rua Mor Olive and Senior Champion Female went to Ian & Jill Coghlan with Eurimbla Next Door. Don Castle took out Champion Bull with Koallah Park Earnest. Nine Herds were represented with 84 animals entered. Great support was provided by drivers Don Castle, Doug D'Oliver and Anne & Frank Moya. Sincere thanks go to Annette for giving up her valuable time to do the judging.

Field Days attended for the year were Seymour Alternative Farming Expo (19-21 February) - Ross Draper and Gay Ward; Lardner Park (7-10 April) organised by Mark Harris; Elmore Field Days (4-6 October) Storm Family, Gay Ward, Ross Draper and Daryl Johnson. Ross Draper and Gay Ward also publicized the Red Poll Breed at the Bendigo Sheep Show with a stand and cattle on the 14th - 17th July. Significant sales have been generated by attending these events as well as promotion of the Breed.

Entries to Royal Shows - Once again, Stormley, Red Cactus and Redward entered cattle in Sydney Royal Easter Show on 17-30 March. Major Awards went to Ross Draper with Red Cactus Joe - Junior, Grand and Supreme Red Poll as well as the Brigadier Hurst Trophy and the W.K. Cowlishaw Trophy. Gay Ward was also successful winning Reserve Champion Junior Heifer with Redward Pazazz.

At Royal Melbourne Show, the major Red Poll awards went to Gay Ward who was awarded Junior and Grand Champion Bull with Redward Forest, while the Storm Family won the big ticket of Grand Champion Female and Supreme Champion with Stormley Lara.

Ross Draper was the first Inductee of the RASV Hall of Fame for his great services to the RASV and the Cattle Industry and received his award at the conclusion of judging of the Red Polls.

Once again, our Region supported the Stud Beef Victoria Cattle Handlers Camp held at the Prince Of Wales Showgrounds, Bendigo from 2-5 July. There were 158 participants and 168 head of cattle. The Red Poll Society sponsored the Champion Senior Parader which was fantastic to see and Hannah Holmberg won this section. Ballot animals were provided by Red Cactus and Stormley Studs. Darby McClaren was awarded fourth place in his Handlers Class and the Brian Alford Award for Best Herdsman in the Junior Section using a Red Poll. Annalise, Brittany and Jamilla Abbott from Turanga Red Polls participated with Turanga Red Poll heifers and Brittany being placed fourth in her handling Class.

Following on from last year's successes by steers of Don Castle and Greg Abbott in Noorat, members of the Region have had considerable successes in 2016. One of Gay Ward's steers was awarded Champion Carcase (88.676 points) and her only other entry was placed 3rd in the same class (84.327), on the hook. A heifer entered by Anne & Frank Moya was also ranked 3rd place on the hoof and 4th in a heavier class on the hook with 80.681 points. These Red Polls were against steers from breeds such as Limousin Cross, Belgian Blue Cross, Hereford Cross, Angus, Limousin, Murray Grey and Bazadaise Cross.

There have been really good direct sale results this year, with at least the following: there have been 14 working age bulls and over 30 females sold direct to Commercial Breeders. The Victorian Region supports members by offering free advertising for their Sale Cattle on our website - http://www.redpollvic.com which is maintained and updated brilliantly by Graham Neal. This has been very successful for those participating.

As requested by Executive, the Victorian Region has provided a proposal for a National Red Poll Sale to the Executive. We hope that this will provide a framework for filling a huge gap in the activities of the Red Poll organization and for showing a greater cohesion in the Breed.

# Crossbreeding in a Dairy Herd

Danny and Sue Blake are dairy farmers near Nirranda in South West Victoria. They have three herds of cattleone beef and two dairy herds which run on 1400 acres. At present they are milking 450 Jersey cows and are looking at 500 cows next year as they have 130 replacement heifers. Their farms are clover based and they don't use nitrogen.

Four years ago they had been having difficulties with a different breed of bulls they were using in regards to their temperament and were concerned about the safety of their workers. They were also some calving problems with bulls throwing big calves resulting in them having to assist with calving hence putting stress on cows and calves and increasing the workload for the Blake's and their workers.

After a discussion with his father, Danny was advised to try some Red Poll bulls and contact was made to Greg Abbott, owner of Turanga Red Poll Stud in Mortlake. Ironically Danny's father had purchased some Red Poll bulls from the same stud many years earlier when it was owned by Eric Abbot, Greg's father.

After listening to Danny's story, Greg selected some young bulls that had low birth weights which Danny brought around ten months of age after they were weaned off their mothers. By selling some bulls early it allows Turanga Red Poll Stud to keep steers and grow them on to our 'paddock to plate' grass fed meat box business where the animals are processed between the age of 16 to 20 months. By doing this we are spreading income across the year and not solely relying on a particular market.

Danny likes the bulls at a young age so he can get them used to walking on concrete in the dairy etc before they go in with the milking herd. The bulls have to be docile as Danny and his workers are working in very close proximity to them and there are a couple in the herd at one given time. Danny on sells his bulls

aged 3-4 years of age as they get too big for his cows. The Turanga Red Poll stud has sold over twenty bulls to the Blake's over the last four years.

The Blake's AI for five and a half weeks using Jersey genetics from America and then using the Red Poll bulls in September to mop up. This year they preg tested 400 cows and only 8 were not in calf. Their cows calve for four months starting in May. Six bulls are used at each dairy and are run in pair rotations, one week on and then two weeks off, this allows for the bulls to remain fresh. The bulls are rested then return to work in a 80 cow crossbreed beef herd for 8 weeks. The bulls are rested and then they start the rotations again with the dairy herds. This year the Blake's reared approximately 50 Red Poll cross Jersey calves, 150 Jersey heifers and 50 Jersey bulls. For a Jersey calf to got on the calf truck it is only worth 8 to 10 dollars a calf, Danny and Sue saw this as a opportunity to 'value add' to their calves. Their calves are sold as either F1 crosses at five days old or are grown on until a suitable time to sell. In the future the Blake's are looking at selling the cross breed calves online.

The Blake's have been very impressed with the temperament of the bulls and they have even noticed a difference in the behaviour between their past breed of calves and the Red Poll cross calves. Danny has said that his past breed of bulls would cause lots of trouble, for instance they would fight in the yards amongst the cows and they were very flighty. He said 'the Red Poll bulls don't cause any trouble as they patiently wait until milking is finished, they are low maintenance and there has been no calving difficulties'. Nicole Pleming, Danny's head worker who runs the second dairy said she 'can't believe how quiet and how easy the bulls are to work with, they just chew their cuds and wait until I let them back in with the cows'.

It's great to hear feedback about the breed exhibiting traits of which they are regarded for docility, ease of calving and fertility.


